**WHEREAS**, the City of Baraboo, Wisconsin (the "Municipality") owns and operates the Baraboo Water Utility (the "Utility") as a public utility; and

**WHEREAS**, the Municipality provides fire protection for the benefit of the public health, safety and well-being of its residents; and

**WHEREAS**, the Utility is authorized by the Wisconsin Public Service Commission (PSC) to recover the cost of providing and maintaining fire hydrants used for public protection; and

**WHEREAS**, the Municipality has included a portion of annual public fire protection charge due to the water utility on the City's property tax levy; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin State Statute Section 196.03(3)(b) allows the Common Council to collect the public fire protection charge through the tax levy or as a direct charge on the water utility bills or a combination of both;

WHEREAS, to provide greater equity for these expenses, the Common Council desires to place the entire public fire protection charge on the utility bills as a direct charge for retail general service customers (Residential and Non-Residential); and

**WHEREAS**, the City desires to use the equivalent meter method for calculating the direct charge;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED,** that the Common Council does request PSC approval to place the entire Public Fire Protection charge as a direct charge on the utility bill using the equivalent meter method; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that City staff are authorized to work with PSC staff in implementing this request and that this change shall be effective April 1, 2024 upon review and approval by the Public Service Commission of the State of Wisconsin. **Motion:CARRIED (7 to 0)**

Whereas, the Common Council of the City of Baraboo has created a Business Improvement District (BID) for the City of Baraboo, and;

Whereas, the BID has submitted an operating plan for the BID for 2024 and;

Whereas, the Operating Plan for the BID proposes that the implementation of the Plan be funded through a special assessment upon all properties within the BID boundaries to the extent that those properties are not exempt from the general property tax, except real property used exclusively for residential purposes. The assessment shall be based on the equalized value of property in the BID and the proposed assessment shall be \$1.4634344 of \$1000 of assessed value.

# Resolved, by the Common Council of the City of Baraboo, Sauk County, Wisconsin:

That the BID operating plan is accepted.

That said Council intends to levy and collect an assessment upon all business, manufacturing and mixed business and residential property in the BID, as follows:

- The purpose of the assessment is to fund the BID Operating Plan for the calendar year 2024
- The limits of the proposed assessment district are as follows:

"The centerline of 1<sup>st</sup> Street and 1<sup>st</sup> Avenue on the South; the centerline of Birch Street on the West, the centerline of the alley running East and West between 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> Avenue on the North; and a line running North and South through the center of Block 12,13,24,25,36 and 37 of the Plat of the City of Baraboo, formerly Adams, on the East."

- The proposed assessment is for calendar year 2024.
- The proposed assessment shall be paid in one installment.
- The proposed assessment shall be on all properties within the BID boundaries to the extent that those properties are not exempt from the general property tax, except real property used exclusively for residential purposes. The date for determining eligibility for exemption from this BID assessment shall be January 1 of the year of the adoption of the Final Resolution by the City Council.
- The amount of the proposed assessment is \$1.4634344 per \$1000 of value of said property based on the 2023 tax roll assessment.
- The proposed assessments shall be due the first day of March 2024, which is the first day of the second month following adoption by the City Council of a resolution levying assessments. Those assessments not paid by that date shall become delinquent as per Section 66.60(15) of the Wis. Stats.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a public hearing to hear public comment concerning BID Assessments will be held on November 28, 2023 at 7:00 p.m. in the Council Chambers. The City Clerk is directed to properly notice all property owners within the BID of the public hearing and proposed assessment.

# THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BARABOO, WISCONSIN, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

1. The City of Baraboo Code of Ordinances § 3.14(1) is revised as follows:

3.14 <u>ROOM TAX</u>. (1641 02/28/92; 2069 10/23/2001)

(1) SIX-EIGHT PERCENT TAX. Pursuant to §66.0615, Wis. Stats., a tax is hereby imposed on the privilege and service of furnishing, at retail, rooms or lodging to transients by hotel keepers, motel operators, and other persons furnishing accommodations that are available to the public, irrespective of whether membership is required for use of the accommodations. In this Subsection, "hotel," "motel," and "transient" shall have the meaning set forth in §77.52(2)(a)1, Wis. Stats. and "gross receipts" shall have the meaning set forth in §77.51(11)(a)(b)(c), Wis. Stats., in so far as applicable. The tax shall be at the rate of 6-8 percent of the gross receipts from such retail furnishing of rooms or lodging. The tax shall not be subject to the selective sales tax imposed by §77.52(2), Wis. Stats. (2069 10/23/2001)

2. This Ordinance shall take effect January 1, 2024.

1. The City of Baraboo Code of Ordinances § 7.14(3)(b) is revised as follows:

(3) VEHICLE PARKING PROHIBITED AT SPECIFIED TIMES. (1951 10/13/98)

(a) During the hours of 7:30 A.M. to 4:30 P.M. on school days, no person shall park, stop, or leave standing, whether attended or unattended, except school buses temporarily for the purpose of and while engaged in loading or unloading or in receiving or discharging passengers on the following streets: (1573 09/25/90)

- 1. The south side of 6<sup>th</sup> Avenue beginning at the west line of Center Street and running thence west 96 feet.
- 2. The north side of 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue beginning at the east line of Angle Street and running thence east 125 feet. (2306 05/26/2009)
- 3. The east side of Wheeler Street between 6<sup>th</sup> Street and 8<sup>th</sup> (2289 10/28/2008)

4. The north side of 5<sup>th</sup> Street adjacent to St. John's Lutheran School starting at a point 180 feet west of the intersection of 5th Street and Elizabeth Street and running thence west 52 feet. (1835 10/24/95)

During the hours of 7:30 A.M. to 3:30 4:00 P.M. on school days, no person shall park, (b) stop, or leave standing, whether attended or unattended, except school buses temporarily for the purpose of and while engaged in loading or unloading or in receiving or discharging passengers on the following streets: (1573 09/25/90, 1546 10/24/89, 1708 11/16/93, 1890 12/03/96, 1951 10/13/98, 2169 12/14/04, 2503 10/09/18)

- 1. The east side of Draper Street beginning at the intersection of Draper Street and 9<sup>th</sup> Avenue and thence north to the north intersection of Draper Street and Winnebago Circle. (1546 10/24/89, 1890 12/03/96, 2169 12/14/2004)
- 2. The west side of Draper Street beginning at the intersection of Draper Street and 8<sup>th</sup> Avenue and thence north to the south driveway leading to the Baraboo Middle School. (2169 12/14/2004)
- 3. The north side of 9<sup>th</sup> Avenue between Park Street and Draper Street. (2169 12/14/2004)
- 4. The south side of 9<sup>th</sup> Avenue beginning at the intersection of 9<sup>th</sup> Avenue and Draper Street and thence west to Berkeley Boulevard. (2169 12/14/2004)
- 5. During the hours of 7:30A.M. to 3:30P.M. on school days, no person shall park, stop, or leave standing, whether attended or unattended, except school buses temporarily for the purpose of and while engaged in loading or unloading or in receiving or discharging passengers, on tThe East side of Winnebago Circle, except that portion of Winnebago Circle designated for two-hour parking pursuant to §7.14(4) of this Code. (1708 11/16/93, 2169 12/14/2004, 2400 08/13/2013)
- 6. During the hours of 7:30A.M. to 3:30P.M. on school days, no person shall park, stop, or leave standing, whether attended or unattended, except school buses temporarily for the purpose of and while engaged in loading or unloading or in receiving or discharging passengers, on tThe north side of 9<sup>th</sup> Avenue between Draper Street and Berkley Blvd. and the east side of Berkley Blvd. north of 9<sup>th</sup> Avenue.

2. This Ordinance shall take effect upon passage and publication as provided by law. Motion:CARRIED (7 to 0)

  - (f) The south side of Water Street between Ash Street and a point 90 feet west of Ash and between points 210 feet east of Rosaline and 425 feet east of Rosaline.

- (g) The north side of Water Street between Ash Street and a point 290 feet west of Ash Street.
- (h) The East Side of Elizabeth between 5th and 6th Streets.
- The south side of 5th Street and Avenue between Birch Street and Broadway and a point 250 feet west of Broadway and the south side of 5th Street between East Street and a point 348 feet east of East Street.
- (j) Both sides of 4th Street and Avenue, between Birch Street and East Street.
- (k) The east side of Jefferson Street, between 11th Street and a point 150 feet north of 11th Street.
- (I) The north side of Sauk Avenue between a point 225 feet west of the center line of Case Street and a point 275 feet east of Moore Street.
  - (m) The north side of 3rd Street between Ash Street and Oak Street. (1904, 5/13/97)
  - (n) The south side of Winnebago Circle for 147 feet east of Draper Street. (2289 10/28/08)

# THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BARABOO, WISCONSIN, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

1. Chapter 5 of the Baraboo Municipal Code shall be and is hereby repealed and recreated to read as follows:

- **5.01 <u>PURPOSE AND INTENT</u>.** This ordinance is intended to provide the City of Baraboo with regulations for contracted fire protection services.
- **5.02 AUTHORITY TO PROVIDE FIRE PROTECTION**. Pursuant to Wis. Stat. §§ 62.13(8)(a) and 66.0301, the Fire Department protecting and operating for the benefit of the City of Baraboo shall be the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District. The management, operation, and regulation of the Fire Department shall be governed by the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District Commission.
- **5.03 DEFINITIONS**. In this Chapter, the following definitions shall apply:

- (1) "<u>ATCP</u>" means the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection.
- (2) "<u>Bonfire</u>" means a large, open fire kindled and maintained to mark a public event, celebration or similar occurrence, which only uses dry, untreated and unpainted wood as the burning material.
- (3) "<u>Burning</u>" means the kindling or maintaining of a fire that has hot ashes or cinders or is giving heat, or still glowing or giving light, or a fire that is still smoldering or giving off smoke, or a fire that has not been completely extinguished.
- (4) "<u>Code</u>" means the municipal code of ordinances for the City of Baraboo.
- (5) "<u>Fire Chief</u>" means the Chief of the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District.
- (6) "<u>Fire Department</u>" means the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District.
- (7) "<u>Fire performance</u>" means any act including, but not limited to, fire juggling, fire tossing, fire eating, fire dancing, etc., that occurs inside or outside of a building in a public or private place that uses fire.
- (8) "<u>NFPA</u>" means the National Fire Protection Association.
- (9) "<u>Open burning</u>" means burning occurring outside of a building.
- (10) "<u>Recreational fires</u>" and "<u>cooking fires</u>" both mean open burning for outdoor recreation and/or cooking purposes in an enclosure designed specifically for ember and flame containment, excluding a barrel, such as rocked-in pits, fireplaces, or barbecue grills which use only charcoal, propane gas, or dry, untreated and unpainted wood as the burning material, and which satisfy the conditions set forth in Section 5.09(2) below.
- (11) "<u>SPS</u>" means the Wisconsin Department of Safety and Professional Services.

# 5.04 AUTHORITY OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT.

- (1) POLICE AUTHORITY AT FIRES. The Fire Chief or subordinate officers in command at any fire are hereby vested with full and complete police authority at fires. Any officer of the Fire Department may cause the arrest of any person failing to give the right of way to the Fire Department in responding to a fire.
- (2) CONTROL OF FIRES. The Fire Chief or subordinate officers in command at any fire may prescribe certain limits in the vicinity of any fire within which no persons excepting firefighters and police officers and those admitted by order of any officer of the Fire Department shall be permitted to enter. The Fire Chief or subordinate officers in command at any fire may cause the removal of any property whenever it shall become necessary for the preservation of such property from fire or to prevent the spreading of fire or to protect the adjoining property, and during the progress of any fire he/she may order the removal or destruction of any property necessary to prevent the further spread of the fire. The Fire Chief or subordinate officers in command at any fire may also cause the removal of all wires or other facilities and the turning off of all electricity or other services where the same impedes the work of the Fire Department during the progress of a fire.
- (3) ENTERING PREMISES. Any firefighter while acting under the direction of the Fire Chief or subordinate officers in command may enter upon the premises adjacent to or in the vicinity of any building or other property for the purpose of extinguishing such fire and if any person shall hinder, resist, or obstruct any firefighter in the discharge of his/her duty as is herein before provided the person so offending shall be deemed guilty of resisting firefighter in the discharge of their duties.
- (4) DUTIES OF BYSTANDERS. Every person who is present at a fire shall be subject to the orders of the Fire Chief or subordinate officers in command and may be required to render assistance in fighting the fire or removing or guarding property. Such an officer may cause the arrest of any person refusing to obey said orders.
- (5) INJURY TO EQUIPMENT PROHIBITED. No person shall willfully injure in any manner any hose, hydrant, or fire apparatus belonging to the Fire Department and no vehicle or railroad equipment shall be driven over any unprotected hose of a fire department when laid down on

any street, private driveway, track, or other place to be used at any fire or alarm of fire without the consent of the Fire Chief or subordinate officers in command.

- (6) DESTRUCTION OF PROPERTY TO PREVENT THE SPREAD OF FIRE. During the progress of any fire, the Fire Chief or subordinate officers in command have the power to order the removal or destruction of any property necessary to prevent the further spread of fire; provided that it is inevitable that, unless such property is removed or destroyed other property is in danger of being of being destroyed by fire.
- **5.05 <u>FIRE PREVENTION</u>**. The Fire Chief shall oversee the fire prevention programs and shall enforce all Wisconsin state laws, administrative codes, and City ordinances pertaining to fire protection and fire prevention.
- (1) STATE CODES ADOPTED. Except as otherwise specifically provided in this Chapter, the statutory provisions of Wis. Stats. § 101.14, Fire Inspections, Prevention, Detection and Suppression, the NFPA 1: Fire Code, 2018 Edition, and the following chapters of the Wisconsin Administrative Code are hereby adopted by reference and made a part of this Code as if fully set forth herein:
  - Ch. ATCP 93 Flammable, Combustible, and Hazards Liquids
  - Ch. ATCP 94 Petroleum and Other Liquid Fuel Products
  - Ch. SPS 307 Explosives and Fireworks
  - Ch. SPS 314 Fire Prevention
  - Ch. SPS 316 Electrical
  - Ch. SPS 318 Elevators, Escalators, and Lift Devices
  - Ch. SPS 328 Smoke Detectors and Carbon Monoxide Detectors

Any act required to be performed or prohibited by any statute or code provisions incorporated herein by reference is required or prohibited by this Code. Any future amendments, revisions, or modifications of the statutes and codes incorporated herein are considered to be made a part of this Code in order to secure uniform statewide regulation.

- (2) FIRE INSPECTOR. The Fire Chief shall hold the office of Fire Inspector with power to appoint one or more Deputy Fire Inspectors, who shall perform the same duties and shall have the same powers as the Fire Inspector.
- (3) FIRE INSPECTION FREQUENCY. It shall be the duty of the Fire Inspector or Deputy Fire Inspector to inspect all buildings and premises at least once per calendar year pursuant to Wis. Admin. Code § SPS 314.01(13)(b)7.a., except the interiors of dwelling units, as often as may be deemed necessary for the purpose of ascertaining and causing to be corrected, any conditions liable to cause fire or any violation of any state law or ordinance relating to fire hazards, or to the prevention of fire. In no event shall the period between inspections exceed fifteen (15) months.
- (4) COMPLIANCE ORDERS. Whenever any fire inspection reveals a violation of this Chapter, the Fire Inspector or Deputy Fire Inspector shall personally deliver, email, or send by certified mail, return receipt requested, a written compliance order to the owner of the property and to the occupant if the property is occupied by a person not the owner thereof, giving said persons a reasonable time, not to exceed sixty (60) calendar days, to correct all violations. If a violation is not corrected within the grace period allowed, a second written compliance order shall be personally delivered, emailed or sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the same persons giving said persons an additional grace period, not to exceed thirty (30) calendar days, to correct the violations. If any violation is not corrected within the grace period allowed by the

second order, a citation may be issued to the owner and to the occupant of the property, or authorized agent thereof.

- (a) Each individual violation on a property and each day any such violation continues after the grace period allowed in the second notice shall constitute a separate offense.
- (b) If a compliance order is not referred to the Wisconsin Department of Safety and Professional Services for further action, an action to abate such nuisance may be commenced by the City as provided in this Code.
- (c) Nothing herein shall be interpreted to mean that a citation cannot be issued immediately upon the finding of a violation of this Chapter, subject to the discretion of the Fire Inspector or Deputy Fire Inspector, based upon the seriousness of the offense, prior similar offenses, or for other reasonable reasons.
- (5) CITATION AUTHORITY. The Fire Chief, Deputy Fire Inspectors, and any law enforcement officer of the City shall be authorized to issue citations for violations of this Chapter.
- (6) SPECIAL CHARGES FOR INSPECTIONS FOR NON-COMPLIANCE. A special charge as authorized by the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District Commission shall be imposed for the second and each subsequent inspection where the inspection reveals that the owner or occupant of the property has not corrected the violations contained in the compliance order. The owner and occupant, or authorized agent thereof, of each property inspected shall be jointly and personally liable for the charge. If the charge is not paid within thirty (30) calendar days of the date of billing, an additional administrative collection charge of 10 percent (10%) of the charge shall be added to the amount due, plus interest shall accrue thereon at the rate 1 percent (1%) per month until paid and such charge shall be extended upon the current or next tax roll as a charge against the inspected property for current services, as provided in § 66.0627, Wis. Stats.
- (7) ENTERING PREMISES. No person shall deny the Fire Chief or Deputy Fire Inspector free access to any property within the City at any reasonable time for the purpose of conducting fire inspections. No person shall hinder or obstruct the Fire Chief or Deputy Fire Inspector in the performance of his/her duty or refuse to observe any lawful direction given by the Inspector. The Fire Chief shall be deemed a peace officer for the purpose of applying for, obtaining and executing a special inspection warrant pursuant to § 66.0119, Wis. Stats.
- (8) INSPECTION DISCLAIMER. The purpose of the inspections under this Chapter is to comply with the fire inspection provisions of the Wisconsin state laws and administrative codes. The inspections and the reports, findings, and orders issued after such inspections are not intended as, nor are they to be construed as, a guarantee. In order to advise owners, occupants, and other interested persons, a disclaimer shall be included in each inspection report as follows: "The findings of the inspection contained herein are intended to report conditions of non-compliance with Code provisions that are readily apparent at the time of inspection. The inspection does not involve a detailed examination of the mechanical systems or the closed premises. The City of Baraboo makes no warranty or representation, expressed or implied that its inspection of the property has discovered all fire code violations or all fire hazards or that this report contains a complete list of all fire code violations existing on the property inspected herein."
- (9) LICENSE OR PERMIT WITHHELD. No license shall be granted or renewed for the operation of any trade, profession, business, or privilege for which a license is required by any provisions of this Code nor shall any occupancy permit be issued for any property that contains any outstanding violation of this Chapter.

- (10) VIOLATION AND PENALTY. Any person who violates, disobeys, neglects, omits, or refuses to comply with, or resists the enforcement of any of the provisions of this Chapter shall be subject to a penalty as provided in Wis. Admin. Code § SPS 314 and/or this Code.
- **5.06 <u>GUNPOWDER</u>**. No person shall keep or store more than 10 pounds of gunpowder at any place within the City of Baraboo without the written permission of the Fire Chief. Any dealer permitted to keep at his place of business in excess of 10 pounds of gunpowder shall not keep more than 200 pounds at any one time, and such gunpowder shall be kept in a safely constructed box painted yellow with the word "POWDER" printed or painted thereon in black letters not less than 5 inches in height and equipped with handles so that the same may be readily moved in case of fire, and such box shall be kept in such part of the dealer's place of business as may be directed by the Fire Chief.
- **5.07 DYNAMITE**. No person shall keep or store within the City of Baraboo any nitroglycerine, dynamite, giant powder, or other explosives more violent than gunpowder without the written permission of the Fire Chief or otherwise than in accordance with the conditions prescribed in such permission as granted and in no case shall more than 50 pounds of any such explosive be stored or kept within 300 feet of any dwelling or other occupied building. The Fire Chief may direct the placement and the manner of keeping the same and the precautions to be observed in connection therewith.
- **5.08 TRAFFIC LAWS APPLY TO VOLUNTEERS**. All Fire Department personnel, when responding to an incident call in a private vehicle, shall comply with all traffic regulations.

# 5.09 **REGULATION OF BURNING**.

- (1) OPEN BURNING PROHIBITED.
- (a) Except as otherwise provided in this Chapter, no person shall burn or cause to be burned any leaves, grass, wood, rubbish, waste, recyclable paper products, recyclable cardboard, painted wood, pressure treated lumber, and/or any material made of in whole or in part or coated with rubber, plastic, leather or petroleum-based materials, and/or products containing flammable materials or other combustible material.
- (b) An open burning permit may be issued by the Fire Chief for prescribed vegetation management purposes subject to reasonable conditions to mitigate fire hazards. The permit fee shall be established by the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District Commission. Applications for a permit must be submitted to the Fire Chief at least seven (7) calendar days prior to the burning. Supervision and inspection costs shall be billed to the owner of the property upon which supervision or inspection is required. Open burning permits shall apply to individual parcels or occupancies and are not transferable from person to person, parcel to parcel, or occupancy to occupancy; however, open burning permits may encompass multiple parcels under common ownership if part of a common vegetation management project.
- (2) REGULATION OF RECREATIONAL FIRES AND COOKING FIRES. Recreational fires and cooking fires are permitted so long as they comply with each of the following conditions:
- (a) Burning, under this Subsection, shall not be kindled or maintained in a barrel.
- (b) No burning shall be kindled or maintained on or within any street, sidewalk, treebank, alley, parking lot, drainage ditch or public right-of-way.
- (c) No burning shall be maintained such that the flames exceed four feet in height.
- (d) No burning shall be maintained so as to cause a public nuisance prohibited by this Code.

- (e) Except for barbecue, gas, and charcoal grills, any other burning receptacle, enclosure or pit shall be no greater than 30 inches in diameter at its greatest width.
- (f) All such burning shall be constantly supervised and personally attended by a responsible adult until the fire is completely extinguished. The person in charge of the fire shall have fire extinguishing equipment or materials available at all times and easily accessible for immediate use.
- (g) Except for barbecue, gas, and charcoal grills, no burning shall be kindled or maintained during periods when either the Fire Chief or the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources has issued a burning ban.
- (h) Whenever a portable fireplace or grill is located on a combustible surface, such as a wooden patio or deck, a non-combustible material shall be placed under and around the fireplace or grill for a distance of at least 24 inches on each side thereof.
- (i) In relation to one- and two-family dwellings, except for barbecue, gas, and charcoal grills, no such burning shall be undertaken within 15 feet of any combustible material, combustible wall or partition, exterior window opening, exit access or exit unless authorized by the Fire Chief.
- (j) In buildings with three or more dwelling units, no burning shall be undertaken within 25 feet of any combustible material, combustible wall or partition, exterior window opening, exit access or exit unless authorized by the Fire Chief.
- (k) In buildings with three or more dwelling units, regardless of type or size, no barbecue, gas, charcoal or electric grill, or any other burning receptacle shall be stored or used on balconies above the first floor, under any overhangs or within 10 feet of the structure.
- (3) BONFIRES REGULATED. No person shall kindle or maintain any bonfire without first obtaining a bonfire permit from the Fire Chief and each such permit shall be subject to the conditions established by the Fire Department. Applications for a permit must be submitted to the Fire Chief at least seven (7) calendar days prior to the bonfire. The permit fee shall be established by the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District Commission.
- (4) FIRE PERFORMANCE. No person shall engage in any fire performance without first obtaining a fire performance permit from the Fire Chief and each permit shall be subject to the conditions established by the Fire Department. Applications for a permit must be submitted to the Fire Chief at least fourteen (14) calendar days prior to the performance. The permit fee shall be established by the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District Commission.
- (5) EXCEPTIONS TO BURNING REGULATIONS. The following fires for burning shall be exempt from the provisions of Chapter:
- (a) Fires conducted inside of a building including, but not limited to, fireplaces and incinerators.
- (b) Fires conducted to remove frost from the ground by public utility companies, City employees, cemeteries, and building contractors.
- (c) Small open flames for welding, acetylene torches, safety flares, heating tar or similar applications.
- (d) Fires conducted for training or instruction of firefighters by the Fire Department or for the testing of fire equipment by the Fire Department.
- (e) Any fire expressly authorized in writing by the Fire Chief. An exception to burning regulations permit issued by the Fire Chief shall be subject to the conditions established by the Fire Department. The fee for an exception to burning regulations permit shall be established by the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District Commission.
- (6) OPEN BURNING PROHIBITED WHEN WIND EXCEEDS EIGHT (8) MILES PER HOUR. No person shall kindle or maintain any open burning within the City whenever the wind speed exceeds eight (8) miles per hour as measured by a portable wind meter device approved by the

Fire Chief. Before taking any enforcement action under this Subsection, the Fire Chief or his/her designee shall first order the violator to completely extinguish the open burning. A citation shall not be issued if the open burning is immediately extinguished after the order to do so has been given. No person shall continue to maintain any open burning after being ordered to completely extinguish the burning as provided in this Chapter.

- (7) PERMIT REQUIREMENTS. All permits required under this Chapter must meet the minimum City licensing and permitting standards as set forth in this Code and shall require the permittee to indemnify the City.
- (8) ENFORCEMENT. The Fire Chief and his/her designee(s) and jurisdictional law enforcement officers of the City shall be authorized to enforce the provisions of this Chapter.
- (9) RECOVERY OF ABATEMENT COST. The City has determined that a violation of this Chapter creates a public nuisance or a hazard to the public safety. Therefore, in addition to any other penalty imposed by this Code for a violation of this Chapter, if the Fire Department is dispatched to a fire caused as a result of any act, omission, condition, or thing that constitutes a violation of this Chapter, the person causing, permitting, or maintaining such occurrence, may be charged a fee to cover the Fire Department's cost for responding to such public nuisance. Any such fee shall be charged as established by the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District Commission. The charge shall be collected as a debt and, if the charge is not paid within thirty (30) calendar days of the date of billing, an administrative collection charge of ten percent (10%) of the charge shall be added to the amount due, plus interest shall accrue thereon at the rate of one percent (1%) per month until paid. If the owner of the property where the public nuisance occurred caused, permitted, or maintained such public nuisance, such charge shall be extended upon the current or next tax roll, to the extent allowed by law.

# 5.10 **FIRE LANES AND FIRE HYDRANTS**.

- (1) FIRE LANES AND FIRE HYDRANTS REQUIRED. Fire lanes and fire hydrants shall be required in accordance with this Chapter on public or private property used for assembly, commercial, educational, industrial, institutional, or multi-family dwelling purposes, and on private property containing residential developments consisting of three or more dwelling units to which access is provided from a public street by a private road or driveway where any dwelling unit is set back more than fifty (50) feet from the paved portion of the public street. Fire lanes may also be designated on those private roads where it is found by the Fire Chief that such access is necessary for firefighting equipment and apparatus. No building permit shall be issued without compliance with the terms of this Chapter if any part of the area being developed contains any of the uses or conditions described in this Chapter.
- (2) LOCATION AND MAINTENANCE OF FIRE LANES AND FIRE HYDRANTS. Fire lanes and fire hydrants shall be located where necessary to provide fire protection to all buildings and premises within the City as determined by the Fire Department. In all cases, a fire hydrant shall be located within 350 feet from each building to be served by the hydrant and all hydrants shall be accessible to fire lanes. All existing and new fire hydrants located on private property shall be routinely inspected, repaired, tested, and maintained by the owner thereof as specified in American Water Works Association Manual 17, Installation, Field Testing and Maintenance of Fire Hydrants, and all fire hydrants shall satisfy the minimum performance requirements established by the Baraboo Water Utility for City fire hydrants. Personnel of the City's Public Works department, Baraboo Water Utility, and Fire Department shall have open and free access to all fire hydrants upon public and private property within the City at any reasonable time for the purpose of inspecting, repairing, testing, and maintaining fire hydrants. The fire flow

test procedures in NFPA Ch. 291, Fire Flow Testing and Marking of Hydrants, shall be followed when performing fire hydrant fire flow tests.

- (3) SNOW REMOVAL. Each owner and/or each occupant of any premises adjacent to a fire lane and/or a fire hydrant shall remove snow and ice from a fire lane and/or each fire hydrant within 48 hours after the cessation of a snow event.
- (4) WRITTEN RECORDS. Written records shall be maintained by the City Utility Superintendent showing the installation, inspection, field testing, repair, and maintenance of each fire hydrant within the City. Such records shall be made available for inspection and copying upon request to the City.
- (5) DUTIES AND POWERS OF FIRE CHIEF. All building and project development plans for projects covered by this Chapter shall be referred to the Fire Chief for examination and approval. If the Fire Chief finds that a proposed fire lane or fire hydrant in a development project does not comply with this Chapter, the Fire Chief shall be authorized to specify the changes necessary to bring the proposal into compliance. The Fire Chief shall inspect the construction of any fire lanes and the placement and specifications of any fire hydrant required by this Chapter and no occupancy permit shall be issued for any project covered by this Chapter until the Fire Chief has inspected and approved the fire lanes and fire hydrants.
- (6) DESIGNATION AND SIGNAGE FOR FIRE LANES. The owner or occupant of any premises where a fire lane is required under this Chapter shall designate and mark all fire lanes and shall post appropriate signs indicating the existence of all fire lanes and indicating that no parking is permitted on fire lanes at any time, as specified and approved by the Fire Chief. Signs and markings shall be used in such locations and in such a manner as in the judgment of the Fire Chief will carry out the purposes of this Chapter and give adequate warning to users of the premises where the fire lanes and fire hydrants are located. Signage and markings shall meet the following minimum standards:
- (a) Where reasonably feasible, signs shall be erected within 5 feet of the beginning and within 5 feet of the end of the fire lane with spacing between signs not exceeding 75 feet. Each sign shall face in the direction of oncoming traffic and shall be affixed to a stationary pole or object.
- (b) Curb along a fire lane shall be painted yellow and if no curb exists, a 4-inch wide stripe shall be painted the full length of the fire lane. Lanes identified exclusively as fire lanes shall be identified with approved fire lane signs on each side facing forward and the pavement area between the signs shall be striped with 4-inch wide yellow strips.
- (7) OBSTRUCTIONS OTHER THAN MOTOR VEHICLES. No person who is the owner or occupant of a premises required by this Chapter to maintain a fire lane or a fire hydrant shall place, locate, permit, or allow the placement or location of any obstruction of any fire lane or so as to block access to any fire hydrant.
- (8) Restricted Parking in Fire Lanes. No person shall park or otherwise leave unattended any motor vehicle within any fire lane.

# 5.11 KEY LOCK BOX SYSTEM.

(1) The following structures shall be equipped with a key lock box or a component thereof at or near the main entrance or such other location required by the Fire Chief:

- (a) Commercial or industrial structures protected by an automatic alarm system or automatic suppression system, or such structures that are secured in a manner that restricts access during an emergency.
- (b) Multi- family residential structures protected by an automatic alarm system, or automatic suppression system, or that have restricted access through locked doors and have a common corridor for access to the living units.
- (c) Governmental structures.
- (d) Any special facilities or properties that may possess restricted access by the means of a fence, gate, or similar device.
- (2) This Subsection shall not be construed to require a key lock box for the following structures or uses:
- (a) One- and two-family dwellings.
- (b) Hospitals, nursing homes, jails, or other institutional use buildings when on-site staff is available at all times.
- (c) Commercial or industrial structures when on-site staff is available at all times.
- (d) In the event that any of the structures or uses as set forth in this paragraph install a key lock box system, it shall meet and comply with all the requirements of this ordinance.
- (3) All newly constructed structures subject to this Chapter shall have the key lock box installed and operational prior to the issuance of an occupancy permit. All existing structures as of the effective date of this ordinance and subject to its provisions shall have one year to install an operational key lock box.
- (4) The Fire Chief shall designate the type of key lock box system to be implemented within the City and shall have the authority to require all structures as set forth above in Subsection 5.11(1) of this ordinance to use the designated system.
- (5) The owner or operator of a structure required to have a key lock box shall, at all times, keep current key(s) in the key lock box, each of which shall be clearly marked so as to indicate its purposes, that will allow access to the structure. The key lock box shall contain the following keys, as applicable:
- (a) Keys to locked points of ingress and egress, whether on the interior or exterior of such buildings.
- (b) Keys to locked mechanical rooms.
- (c) Keys to locked elevator rooms.
- (d) Keys to elevator controls.
- (e) Keys to any fence or secured areas.
- (f) Keys to any other areas as directed by the Fire Chief or Deputy Fire Inspector.
- (g) Keys required by this Chapter shall not include keys to individual living units in a multi-family residential structure.
- (6) The Fire Chief shall be authorized to implement rules and regulations for the placement and use of the key lock box system.
- (7) The Fire Department is authorized to share key lock box access with other public safety departments, including the Sauk County Sheriff's Department, and the City Police Department, under rules and policies to be established by the Fire Chief.
- (8) Entry keys shall be updated as necessary and will be checked as part of the fire inspection visits.

- (9) The owner or operator of a structure required to have a key lock box system shall provide to the Fire Department a list each year of the emergency contacts in case of an emergency requiring the use of the key lock box.
- (10) Any person who owns or operates a structure subject to this Chapter shall be subject to the penalties set forth in general penalty provisions of this Code for any violations of this Chapter.
- **5.12 SEVERABILITY**. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Chapter is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by reason of any decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of any other section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase or portion thereof, and to this extent, the provisions of this ordinance shall be severable.
- **5.13 PENALTY**. Any person who violates, disobeys, neglects, omits, or refuses to comply with or who resists the enforcement of any of the provisions of this Chapter, or any order, rule, or regulation made hereunder shall be subject to a penalty of \$100-\$500. In addition to the payment of a forfeiture, the City Attorney may, in addition to other remedies provided by law, institute appropriate action or proceedings to prevent or enjoin the erection, enlargement, alteration, repair, moving or occupancy of any building or structure located on any premises in violation of this Chapter. In any such action, the fact that a permit was issued shall not constitute a defense and each violation and each day a violation continues or occurs shall constitute a separate offense.

(c) Administrative Committee. #### **Shared-Ride Taxi Service**

J. Ostrander presented budget information on the 2024 Shared-Ride Taxi Service. For 2024, we will be paying \$701,993 to our third-party operator, Abby Vans, Inc. The budget presented also includes the estimated grant funds and fares that will be received. On average, there is currently 1.7 rides per hours. Some potential changes include adjusting the service hours, decreasing the number of vans available during the service hours, adjusting the holiday hours to be from the morning to the afternoon, and increasing fares. She also notes that any additional cuts we make will affect the grant funds received. J. Ostrander will do further research into the agency fares, this will not affect grant funds. Ald. Sloan noted the decrease in ridership in 2020 corresponds to COVID. Mayor Nelson noted that the decrease in ridership also corresponds to the change of the third-party operator, Abby Vans, Inc. At this time, Abby Vans, Inc. is not currently willing to negotiate the current agreement. Depending on the changes Council recommends, if Abby Vans is not willing to negotiate, our only option may be to terminate the agreement if Abby Vans, Inc. Preliminary Draft 2024 Budget

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Adm. Bradley presented the 2024 financial projection based on current, approved development agreements. Averaged out over the next 10 years we are looking at a 3.1% annualized rate of growth. While the growth that is taking place is good, expenses will continue to increase at a faster rate. For 2025, he is estimating a \$593,000 increase in the levy. Included in the projection for revenues is net new construction, street aid, and room tax. Total projected unrestricted new revenue for 2025 is \$639,000, for 2026 is \$309,000, and another half million for 2027. This will taper down following these years. As for expenditures, one of the recommendations going forward is to replace the current wood chips with hard surface playgrounds. This would allow for no additional costs for parks. As for streets, looking at the cost per mile, we are estimating \$12,295 per mile in maintenance. There will be additional expenses for the police department in future years for additional staff, based on the increase in population. The 2024 budget shows a deficit of approximately \$749,000. The capital budget is deficient by \$495,000. Based on COLA numbers, we are short about \$393,000 on wages. Looking at the cumulative numbers, assuming no new cost, the new growth will start benefiting the City in 2027. Costs are going to increase, the City will have to make cuts while encouraging growth. The committee reviewed the preliminary 2024 budget. There will be some future decisions that need to be made regarding capital replacement. Looking at the budget deficit, some options for cutting next year include not opening the pool, any adjustments made to the shared-ride taxi service, the revenue shift of the Fire Hydrant Rental, and an increase to the room tax.

h Consider participation in WDNR's Lead Service Line replacement loan program - Peterson said theatrically we did not get good news from this. He then contacted Brea, loan person from SEH via telephone to speak to the Committee. Peterson said we applied for the loan thinking we would get 25% principal forgiveness, we met with the DNR last week and we were told we get no principal forgiveness. He said that we could still go forward with the load which has a couple of benefits for our customers, but definitely has some drawbacks and additional costs for the Utility. Peterson said to do the loan, administer the loan, and go out for public bids for replacing the services all have expenses to the Utility, but not of this is reimbursable through the program. He said administration by SHE would be an additional \$13,500. He said that it would allow the avenue of trying to create some type of program for our property owners that would make an offer of lower interest rate, but that would have to be set up with PSC. Peterson said that the DNR said that they trying to work a thing that you would not have to get approval from the PSC, which was a surprise to him. Peterson said that if we don't go with the program, everyone would have to be sent a letter stating that within no later than 120 day from the Utility replacing their service they replace theirs or their water would be shut off. He said that there are 13 services along 8th Street/8th Avenue that have still not been able to be identified, of the rest of the services there are 42 galvanized services and 3 lead services. Kolb asked if this would preclude the City from giving the property owners the same as what is done with public sidewalk assessments. Peterson said that the Utility can create loan program through the PSC or if the DNR can figure a way to get around the PSC similar to sidewalk assessment, but it would take time and money to do so. Pinion said that it would have to be modified in some way because this would not be part of the public infrastructure. Peterson said that if the Utility creates this program they would have to create bid documents to go out for the 40 some replacements. Brea and Peterson said that the letter could give the property owner the option to replace the lines on their own. Peterson said that if we don't do the program and the homeowner had to find their own plumber, the pre-qualified list that we have, he doubts that many would participate because they knew that they would get the money from us, and now when they would have to rely on getting their money from the homeowner, definitely more risk, they may not want to participate. Olson asked if we went with the DNR low interest with no principal forgiveness could it possibly change in the future. Peterson said that if we did another loan program and specifically targeted certain areas of the City that is disadvantaged then we could. He said when we applied for the loan with the 8th Street area it was determined that it was not disadvantaged enough and that is why we are not getting the principal forgiveness. Peterson said that the DNR program would be the best for the customers, but the most work and expense for the Utility. Kolb feels that we have to give this to the customers a break. Pinion said that that we could work into the loan documentation part of the administrative costs. Peterson feels that the letters should be out by early November. Peterson said that he will continue to move forward with the loan application and start to try putting things together for building this program. It was moved by Olson, seconded by Kolb to participate in the WDNR's Lead Service Line Replacement Loan Program. Motion carried unanimously.

#### Information Items

a. <u>STH 33 Reconstruction Project – Status Report</u> – Pinion said that other than traffic and people ignoring the signs the construction is going well. He said that excavation is underway. Pinion thanked the Police Department for the help with traffic control. He said everything is going very well with the DOT and their consultant's part of coordinating things and keeping the City involved.

#### **Reports**

- a. Utility Superintendent's Report
  - i. Staffing Updates Remains the same.
    - ii. Project Updates Peterson said that he attended the September Wisconsin River Rail Transit Commission meeting. WOR & DOT wanted the Commission to take action on mandating that the sewer line be removed from the viaduct. He said Sauk County Rep, motioned to delay action until next month, the final decision was forwarded to the Commission's Litigation Committee. Peterson said that he reached out to the RR Commission, DOT, and WSOR to determine what the City's next course of action would be, but did not receive a response from anyone. Peterson said that there are two attorney firms that the City will be speaking with on Wednesday for possible assistance. Pinion presented a very detailed explanation of this issue from beginning to date.

Peterson said water and sewer budgets have to be presented to City staff the end of next week. Final numbers would be able to put in until the end of this week because 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter bills will be sent out this week. He said Baker Tilley has not finalized our sewer rate study, but the estimate at the moment is a 7% rate increase, 8% on the water side, depends on how it go, we may do it all in one, or do 3.5 in 2024 and 3.5 in 2025.

Peterson said that there have been a lot of discussion about transferring municipality public fire protection fee to the utility bills; as a result, 100% of public fire protection will be billed directly to the ratepayer rather than a portion being on the property owner's tax bill. Since fire protection is charged based on meter size, Commercial, Industrial, and Public Authority accounts would increase significantly. He said that the Utility pays taxes to the City and is the fourth highest paying entity in the City.

- b. Street Superintendent's Report
  - i. Staffing Updates Staffing remains the same.

- ii. Activity Report Pinion said the department finished out the month doing some patches and ad the alleys that were scheduled for this year have all been completed. He said that we are in the Carbo Reduction Program. Holophane a vendor experienced with projects of this magnitude has offered to provide a preliminary lighting design and would like to schedule a time to bring their product for a show and tell. Pinion said that we are saving \$11.00/ton on salt for the 2023/2024 winter season.
- c. Police Chief's Report
  - i. Staffing Updates Sinden said the department is still one sworn officer short, they have went over 100 days without having any applications that were qualified to hire. Sinden gave a status report on hiring pre-academy officers. He said that they have 7 applicants without academy, but all the other qualification look very good. He said the applicants can finish all field training before finishing the academy.
  - ii. Case/Response Update Sinden said that Homecoming week went very well, better than 2022. Sinden said the department is working with a certified licensed athletic trainer for physical ability only because this has not been visited for quite some time. He hopes to have the process finalized so that the Committee can view that at the next meeting. He said that the cases are running very flat about the same as last year. Sinden explained the process with Commitment and Mental Health cases.

AJOURNMENT – There being no further business, Kolb declared the meeting adjourned at 4:16 p.m.


# Notice of Public Hearing for Special Assessments in the Baraboo Business Improvement District

An Ordinance revising the City of Baraboo Code of Ordinances §3.14 Room Tax

#### THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BARABOO, WISCONSIN, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

1. The City of Baraboo Code of Ordinances  $\S$  3.14(1) is revised as follows:

#### 3.14 <u>ROOM TAX</u>. (1641 02/28/92; 2069 10/23/2001)

- (1) SIXEIGHT PERCENT TAX. Pursuant to §66.0615, Wis. Stats., a tax is hereby imposed on the privilege and service of furnishing, at retail, rooms or lodging to transients by hotel keepers, motel operators, and other persons furnishing accommodations that are available to the public, irrespective of whether membership is required for use of the accommodations. In this Subsection, "hotel," "motel," and "transient" shall have the meaning set forth in §77.52(2)(a)1, Wis. Stats. and "gross receipts" shall have the meaning set forth in §77.51(11)(a)(b)(c), Wis. Stats., in so far as applicable. The tax shall be at the rate of 68 percent of the gross receipts from such retail furnishing of rooms or lodging. The tax shall not be subject to the selective sales tax imposed by §77.52(2), Wis. Stats. (2069 10/23/2001)
- 2. This Ordinance shall take effect January 1, 2024.

# <u>11.2</u>Ordinance

## The City of Baraboo, Wisconsin

**Background:** The Baraboo School District adjusted the hours of the Middle and High Schools in early 2023 to release at 3:30pm instead of the previous release time of 3:10pm. This change in the school release time affects the ability of school buses/other transportation methods to find room to park in the area after the current 3:30pm parking limit expires. They are forced to be in the area later than the posted parking restrictions causing backups and delays.

The Police Chief is requesting §7.14 "Traffic and Parking Regulations on and Adjacent to School District Grounds", specifically §7.14(3)(b) "Vehicle Parking Prohibited at Specified Times", be amended as included below.

"During the hours of 7:30 A.M. to <del>3:30</del> 4:00pm on school days, no person shall park, stop, or leave standing, whether attended or unattended, except school buses temporarily for the purpose of and while engaged in loading or unloading or in receiving or discharging passengers on the following streets..."

The Police Chief will work with the Street Superintendent to modify the existing signs near the Middle and High Schools to reflect the municipal code revision.

      - The south side of 6<sup>th</sup> Avenue beginning at the west line of Center Street and running thence west 96 feet.
      - 2. The north side of 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue beginning at the east line of Angle Street and running thence east 125 feet. (2306 05/26/2009)
      - 3. The east side of Wheeler Street between 6<sup>th</sup> Street and 8<sup>th</sup> Street. (2289 10/28/2008)
      - 4. The north side of 5<sup>th</sup> Street adjacent to St. John's Lutheran School starting at a point 180 feet west of the intersection of 5<sup>th</sup> Street and Elizabeth Street and running thence west 52 feet. (1835 10/24/95)
    - (b) During the hours of 7:30 A.M. to 3:30\_4:00 P.M. on school days, no person shall park, stop, or leave standing, whether attended or unattended, except school buses temporarily for the purpose of and while engaged in loading or unloading or in receiving or discharging passengers on the following streets: (1573 09/25/90, 1546 10/24/89, 1708 11/16/93, 1890 12/03/96, 1951 10/13/98, 2169 12/14/04, 2503 10/09/18)
      - 1. The east side of Draper Street beginning at the intersection of Draper Street and 9<sup>th</sup> Avenue and thence north to the north intersection of Draper Street and Winnebago Circle. (1546 10/24/89,

1890 12/03/96, 2169 12/14/2004)

- 2. The west side of Draper Street beginning at the intersection of Draper Street and 8<sup>th</sup> Avenue and thence north to the south driveway leading to the Baraboo Middle School. (2169 12/14/2004)
- 3. The north side of 9th Avenue between Park Street and Draper Street. (2169 12/14/2004)
- 4. The south side of 9<sup>th</sup> Avenue beginning at the intersection of 9<sup>th</sup> Avenue and Draper Street and thence west to Berkeley Boulevard. (2169 12/14/2004)
- 5. **Background:** As part of the soon to be completed Carnegie-Schadde Memorial Public Library Expansion and Remodel Project, the City's parking lots on the north side of the Library were reconfigured and two new driveways, one entrance and one exit, were added on 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue. The south curb on 5<sup>th</sup> Ave across the frontage of these two lots was realigned and moved north a few feet. Accordingly, there is not sufficient room to provide on-street angle parking stalls along this frontage.

Angel Parking is regulated by Section 7.09 Parking Restrictions so it is necessary to modify Section 7.09(2)(i) to reflect these changes.

The Public Safety Committee reviewed this matter at their October 31<sup>st</sup> meeting and has recommended approval of this Ordinance revision.

#### THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BARABOO, WISCONSIN, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The City of Baraboo Code of Ordinances § 7.09(2)(i) is revised as follows:
  - (2) ANGLE PARKING. On streets or portions thereof, where angle parking is provided, vehicles shall be parked in accordance with the angles designated by painted lines and shall be subject to the restrictions concerning parking as hereinafter set forth. Angle parking is provided for on the following streets:
    - (a) The south side of 3<sup>rd</sup> Street and Avenue between East and Ash Streets and between Oak Street and a point 224 feet west of Broadway. (1466 03/24/87)
    - (b) The north side of 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue between Oak Street and a point 230 feet west of Broadway.
    - (c) The East Side of Oak Street between 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Streets and Avenues.
    - (d) 4<sup>th</sup> Street and Avenue between East Street and Birch Street.
    - (e) The East Side of Walnut Street between Lynn Street and the Baraboo River.
    - (f) The south side of Water Street between Ash Street and a point 90 feet west of Ash and between points 210 feet east of Rosaline and 425 feet east of Rosaline.
    - (g) The north side of Water Street between Ash Street and a point 290 feet west of Ash Street.
    - (h) The East Side of Elizabeth between 5th and 6th Streets.
    - (i) The south side of 5<sup>th</sup> Street and Avenue between Birch Street and Broadway and a point 250 feet west of Broadway and the south side of 5<sup>th</sup> Street between East Street and a point 348 feet east of East Street.
    - (j) Both sides of 4<sup>th</sup> Street and Avenue, between Birch Street and East Street.
    - (k) The east side of Jefferson Street, between 11<sup>th</sup> Street and a point 150 feet north of 11<sup>th</sup> Street.
    - (1) The north side of Sauk Avenue between a point 225 feet west of the center line of Case Street and a point 275 feet east of Moore Street.

#### 11.4 The City of Baraboo, Wisconsin

**BACKGROUND:** The Baraboo Common Council adopted the Intergovernmental Agreement and Bylaws for the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District on October 11, 2022. With the creation of the new Joint District on January 1, 2023, the existing Baraboo Fire Department ceased to exist. This Ordinance reflects this change and recreates Chapter 5 to bring consistency and standardization to the fire prevention ordinances across the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District.

Additionally, this Ordinance creates Section 25.01(6) and (7), repeals and reserves Section 1.02(5), and amends Sections 1.03, 1.10(1)(a) and (3)(k), 1.19(2), 1.59(3)(c), 2.05(3)(b) and (c), 4.01(2), 7.09(16)(b)(i) and (ii), 10.05(18), 10.10(3), (5) and (6), 11.10, 13.16(3)(a), 17.13A(3)(b)ii., iii., and v., 17.27(8)(c), and 17.66 2.4(4). These changes reconcile the Baraboo Municipal Code with the organizational structure of the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District, the new title of the Baraboo Police Commission, and corrects internal references within the code.

- **5.01 <u>PURPOSE AND INTENT</u>. This ordinance is intended to provide the City of Baraboo with regulations for contracted fire protection services.</u>**

benefit of the City of Baraboo shall be the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District. The management, operation, and regulation of the Fire Department shall be governed by the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District Commission.

# 5.03 **<u>DEFINITIONS</u>**. In this Chapter, the following definitions shall apply:

- (1) "<u>ATCP</u>" means the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection.
- (2) "<u>Bonfire</u>" means a large, open fire kindled and maintained to mark a public event, celebration or similar occurrence, which only uses dry, untreated and unpainted wood as the burning material.
- (3) "<u>Burning</u>" means the kindling or maintaining of a fire that has hot ashes or cinders or is giving heat, or still glowing or giving light, or a fire that is still smoldering or giving off smoke, or a fire that has not been completely extinguished.
- (4) "<u>Code</u>" means the municipal code of ordinances for the City of Baraboo.
- (5) "<u>Fire Chief</u>" means the Chief of the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District.
- (6) "<u>Fire Department</u>" means the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District.
- (7) "<u>Fire performance</u>" means any act including, but not limited to, fire juggling, fire tossing, fire eating, fire dancing, etc., that occurs inside or outside of a building in a public or private place that uses fire.
- (8) "<u>NFPA</u>" means the National Fire Protection Association.
- (9) "<u>Open burning</u>" means burning occurring outside of a building.
- (10) "<u>Recreational fires</u>" and "<u>cooking fires</u>" both mean open burning for outdoor recreation and/or cooking purposes in an enclosure designed specifically for ember and flame containment, excluding a barrel, such as rocked-in pits, fireplaces, or barbecue grills which use only charcoal, propane gas, or dry, untreated and unpainted wood as the burning material, and which satisfy the conditions set forth in Section 5.09(2) below.
- (11) "<u>SPS</u>" means the Wisconsin Department of Safety and Professional Services.

# 5.04 <u>AUTHORITY OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT</u>.

(1) POLICE AUTHORITY AT FIRES. The Fire Chief or subordinate officers in command at any fire are hereby vested with full and complete police authority at fires. Any officer of the Fire Department may cause the arrest of any person failing to give the right of way to the Fire Department in responding to a fire.

- (2) CONTROL OF FIRES. The Fire Chief or subordinate officers in command at any fire may prescribe certain limits in the vicinity of any fire within which no persons excepting firefighters and police officers and those admitted by order of any officer of the Fire Department shall be permitted to enter. The Fire Chief or subordinate officers in command at any fire may cause the removal of any property whenever it shall become necessary for the preservation of such property from fire or to prevent the spreading of fire or to protect the adjoining property, and during the progress of any fire he/she may order the removal or destruction of any property necessary to prevent the further spread of the fire. The Fire Chief or subordinate officers in command at any fire may also cause the removal of all wires or other facilities and the turning off of all electricity or other services where the same impedes the work of the Fire Department during the progress of a fire.
- (3) ENTERING PREMISES. Any firefighter while acting under the direction of the Fire Chief or subordinate officers in command may enter upon the premises adjacent to or in the vicinity of any building or other property for the purpose of extinguishing such fire and if any person shall hinder, resist, or obstruct any firefighter in the discharge of his/her duty as is herein before provided the person so offending shall be deemed guilty of resisting firefighter in the discharge of their duties.
- (4) DUTIES OF BYSTANDERS. Every person who is present at a fire shall be subject to the orders of the Fire Chief or subordinate officers in command and may be required to render assistance in fighting the fire or removing or guarding property. Such an officer may cause the arrest of any person refusing to obey said orders.
- (5) INJURY TO EQUIPMENT PROHIBITED. No person shall willfully injure in any manner any hose, hydrant, or fire apparatus belonging to the Fire Department and no vehicle or railroad equipment shall be driven over any unprotected hose of a fire department when laid down on any street, private driveway, track, or other place to be used at any fire or alarm of fire without the consent of the Fire Chief or subordinate officers in command.
- (6) DESTRUCTION OF PROPERTY TO PREVENT THE SPREAD OF FIRE. During the progress of any fire, the Fire Chief or subordinate officers in command have the power to order the removal or destruction of any property necessary to prevent the further spread of fire; provided that it is inevitable that, unless such property is removed or destroyed other property is in danger of being of being destroyed by fire.
- **5.05 <u>FIRE PREVENTION</u>**. The Fire Chief shall oversee the fire prevention programs and shall enforce all Wisconsin state laws, administrative codes, and City ordinances pertaining to fire protection and fire prevention.
  - (1) STATE CODES ADOPTED. Except as otherwise specifically provided in this Chapter, the statutory provisions of Wis. Stats. § 101.14, Fire Inspections, Prevention, Detection and Suppression, the NFPA 1: Fire Code, 2018 Edition, and the following chapters of the Wisconsin Administrative Code are hereby adopted by reference and made a part of this Code as if fully set forth herein:

Any act required to be performed or prohibited by any statute or code provisions incorporated herein by reference is required or prohibited by this Code. Any future amendments, revisions, or modifications of the statutes and codes incorporated herein are considered to be made a part of this Code in order to secure uniform statewide regulation.

- (2) FIRE INSPECTOR. The Fire Chief shall hold the office of Fire Inspector with power to appoint one or more Deputy Fire Inspectors, who shall perform the same duties and shall have the same powers as the Fire Inspector.
- (3) FIRE INSPECTION FREQUENCY. It shall be the duty of the Fire Inspector or Deputy Fire Inspector to inspect all buildings and premises at least once per calendar year pursuant to Wis. Admin. Code § SPS 314.01(13)(b)7.a., except the interiors of dwelling units, as often as may be deemed necessary for the purpose of ascertaining and causing to be corrected, any conditions liable to cause fire or any violation of any state law or ordinance relating to fire hazards, or to the prevention of fire. In no event shall the period between inspections exceed fifteen (15) months.
- (4) COMPLIANCE ORDERS. Whenever any fire inspection reveals a violation of this Chapter, the Fire Inspector or Deputy Fire Inspector shall personally deliver, email, or send by certified mail, return receipt requested, a written compliance order to the owner of the property and to the occupant if the property is occupied by a person not the owner thereof, giving said persons a reasonable time, not to exceed sixty (60) calendar days, to correct all violations. If a violation is not corrected within the grace period allowed, a second written compliance order shall be personally delivered, emailed or sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the same persons giving said persons an additional grace period, not to exceed thirty (30) calendar days, to correct the violations. If any violation is not corrected within the grace period allowed by the second order, a citation may be issued to the owner and to the occupant of the property, or authorized agent thereof.
  - (a) Each individual violation on a property and each day any such violation continues after the grace period allowed in the second notice shall constitute a separate offense.
  - (b) If a compliance order is not referred to the Wisconsin Department of Safety and Professional Services for further action, an action to abate such nuisance may be commenced by the City as provided in this Code.
  - (c) Nothing herein shall be interpreted to mean that a citation cannot be issued immediately upon the finding of a violation of this Chapter, subject to the discretion of the Fire Inspector or Deputy Fire

Inspector, based upon the seriousness of the offense, prior similar offenses, or for other reasonable reasons.

- (5) CITATION AUTHORITY. The Fire Chief, Deputy Fire Inspectors, and any law enforcement officer of the City shall be authorized to issue citations for violations of this Chapter.
- (6) SPECIAL CHARGES FOR INSPECTIONS FOR NON-COMPLIANCE. A special charge as authorized by the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District Commission shall be imposed for the second and each subsequent inspection where the inspection reveals that the owner or occupant of the property has not corrected the violations contained in the compliance order. The owner and occupant, or authorized agent thereof, of each property inspected shall be jointly and personally liable for the charge. If the charge is not paid within thirty (30) calendar days of the date of billing, an additional administrative collection charge of 10 percent (10%) of the charge shall be added to the amount due, plus interest shall accrue thereon at the rate 1 percent (1%) per month until paid and such charge shall be extended upon the current or next tax roll as a charge against the inspected property for current services, as provided in § 66.0627, Wis. Stats.
- (7) ENTERING PREMISES. No person shall deny the Fire Chief or Deputy Fire Inspector free access to any property within the City at any reasonable time for the purpose of conducting fire inspections. No person shall hinder or obstruct the Fire Chief or Deputy Fire Inspector in the performance of his/her duty or refuse to observe any lawful direction given by the Inspector. The Fire Chief shall be deemed a peace officer for the purpose of applying for, obtaining and executing a special inspection warrant pursuant to § 66.0119, Wis. Stats.
- (8) INSPECTION DISCLAIMER. The purpose of the inspections under this Chapter is to comply with the fire inspection provisions of the Wisconsin state laws and administrative codes. The inspections and the reports, findings, and orders issued after such inspections are not intended as, nor are they to be construed as, a guarantee. In order to advise owners, occupants, and other interested persons, a disclaimer shall be included in each inspection report as follows: "The findings of the inspection contained herein are intended to report conditions of non-compliance with Code provisions that are readily apparent at the time of inspection. The inspection does not involve a detailed examination of the mechanical systems or the closed premises. The City of Baraboo makes no warranty or representation, expressed or implied that its inspection of the property has discovered all fire code violations or all fire hazards or that this report contains a complete list of all fire code violations existing on the property inspected herein."
- (9) LICENSE OR PERMIT WITHHELD. No license shall be granted or renewed for the operation of any trade, profession, business, or privilege for which a license is required by any provisions of this Code nor shall any occupancy permit be issued for any property that contains any outstanding violation of this Chapter.
- (10) VIOLATION AND PENALTY. Any person who violates, disobeys, neglects, omits, or refuses to comply with, or resists the enforcement of any

of the provisions of this Chapter shall be subject to a penalty as provided in Wis. Admin. Code § SPS 314 and/or this Code.

- **5.06 <u>GUNPOWDER</u>**. No person shall keep or store more than 10 pounds of gunpowder at any place within the City of Baraboo without the written permission of the Fire Chief. Any dealer permitted to keep at his place of business in excess of 10 pounds of gunpowder shall not keep more than 200 pounds at any one time, and such gunpowder shall be kept in a safely constructed box painted yellow with the word "POWDER" printed or painted thereon in black letters not less than 5 inches in height and equipped with handles so that the same may be readily moved in case of fire, and such box shall be kept in such part of the dealer's place of business as may be directed by the Fire Chief.
- **5.07 DYNAMITE**. No person shall keep or store within the City of Baraboo any nitroglycerine, dynamite, giant powder, or other explosives more violent than gunpowder without the written permission of the Fire Chief or otherwise than in accordance with the conditions prescribed in such permission as granted and in no case shall more than 50 pounds of any such explosive be stored or kept within 300 feet of any dwelling or other occupied building. The Fire Chief may direct the placement and the manner of keeping the same and the precautions to be observed in connection therewith.
- **5.08 <u>TRAFFIC LAWS APPLY TO VOLUNTEERS</u>**. All Fire Department personnel, when responding to an incident call in a private vehicle, shall comply with all traffic regulations.

# 5.09 <u>REGULATION OF BURNING</u>.

- (1) OPEN BURNING PROHIBITED.
- (a) Except as otherwise provided in this Chapter, no person shall burn or cause to be burned any leaves, grass, wood, rubbish, waste, recyclable paper products, recyclable cardboard, painted wood, pressure treated lumber, and/or any material made of in whole or in part or coated with rubber, plastic, leather or petroleum-based materials, and/or products containing flammable materials or other combustible material.
- (b) An open burning permit may be issued by the Fire Chief for prescribed vegetation management purposes subject to reasonable conditions to mitigate fire hazards. The permit fee shall be established by the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District Commission. Applications for a permit must be submitted to the Fire Chief at least seven (7) calendar days prior to the burning. Supervision and inspection costs shall be billed to the owner of the property upon which supervision or inspection is required. Open burning permits shall apply to individual parcels or occupancies and are not transferable from person to person, parcel to parcel, or occupancy to occupancy; however, open burning permits may encompass multiple parcels under common ownership if part of a common vegetation management project.
  - (2) REGULATION OF RECREATIONAL FIRES AND COOKING FIRES. Recreational fires and cooking fires are permitted so long as they comply with each of the following conditions:

- (a) Burning, under this Subsection, shall not be kindled or maintained in a barrel.
- (b) No burning shall be kindled or maintained on or within any street, sidewalk, treebank, alley, parking lot, drainage ditch or public right-of-way.
- (c) No burning shall be maintained such that the flames exceed four feet in height.
- (d) No burning shall be maintained so as to cause a public nuisance prohibited by this Code.
- (e) Except for barbecue, gas, and charcoal grills, any other burning receptacle, enclosure or pit shall be no greater than 30 inches in diameter at its greatest width.
- (f) All such burning shall be constantly supervised and personally attended by a responsible adult until the fire is completely extinguished. The person in charge of the fire shall have fire extinguishing equipment or materials available at all times and easily accessible for immediate use.
- (g) Except for barbecue, gas, and charcoal grills, no burning shall be kindled or maintained during periods when either the Fire Chief or the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources has issued a burning ban.
- (h) Whenever a portable fireplace or grill is located on a combustible surface, such as a wooden patio or deck, a non-combustible material shall be placed under and around the fireplace or grill for a distance of at least 24 inches on each side thereof.
- In relation to one- and two-family dwellings, except for barbecue, gas, and charcoal grills, no such burning shall be undertaken within 15 feet of any combustible material, combustible wall or partition, exterior window opening, exit access or exit unless authorized by the Fire Chief.
- (j) In buildings with three or more dwelling units, no burning shall be undertaken within 25 feet of any combustible material, combustible wall or partition, exterior window opening, exit access or exit unless authorized by the Fire Chief.
- (k) In buildings with three or more dwelling units, regardless of type or size, no barbecue, gas, charcoal or electric grill, or any other burning receptacle shall be stored or used on balconies above the first floor, under any overhangs or within 10 feet of the structure.
- (3) BONFIRES REGULATED. No person shall kindle or maintain any bonfire without first obtaining a bonfire permit from the Fire Chief and each such permit shall be subject to the conditions established by the Fire Department. Applications for a permit must be submitted to the Fire Chief at least seven

(7) calendar days prior to the bonfire. The permit fee shall be established by the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District Commission.

- (4)
- (5) FIRE PERFORMANCE. No person shall engage in any fire performance without first obtaining a fire performance permit from the Fire Chief and each permit shall be subject to the conditions established by the Fire Department. Applications for a permit must be submitted to the Fire Chief at least fourteen (14) calendar days prior to the performance. The permit fee shall be established by the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District Commission.
- (6) EXCEPTIONS TO BURNING REGULATIONS. The following fires for burning shall be exempt from the provisions of Chapter:
  - (a) Fires conducted inside of a building including, but not limited to, fireplaces and incinerators.
  - (b) Fires conducted to remove frost from the ground by public utility companies, City employees, cemeteries, and building contractors.
  - (c) Small open flames for welding, acetylene torches, safety flares, heating tar or similar applications.
  - (d) Fires conducted for training or instruction of firefighters by the Fire Department or for the testing of fire equipment by the Fire Department.
  - (e) Any fire expressly authorized in writing by the Fire Chief. An exception to burning regulations permit issued by the Fire Chief shall be subject to the conditions established by the Fire Department. The fee for an exception to burning regulations permit shall be established by the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District Commission.
- (7) OPEN BURNING PROHIBITED WHEN WIND EXCEEDS EIGHT (8) MILES PER HOUR. No person shall kindle or maintain any open burning within the City whenever the wind speed exceeds eight (8) miles per hour as measured by a portable wind meter device approved by the Fire Chief. Before taking any enforcement action under this Subsection, the Fire Chief or his/her designee shall first order the violator to completely extinguish the open burning. A citation shall not be issued if the open burning is immediately extinguished after the order to do so has been given. No person shall continue to maintain any open burning after being ordered to completely extinguish the burning as provided in this Chapter.
- (8) PERMIT REQUIREMENTS. All permits required under this Chapter must meet the minimum City licensing and permitting standards as set forth in this Code and shall require the permittee to indemnify the City.

- (9) ENFORCEMENT. The Fire Chief and his/her designee(s) and jurisdictional law enforcement officers of the City shall be authorized to enforce the provisions of this Chapter.
- (10)RECOVERY OF ABATEMENT COST. The City has determined that a violation of this Chapter creates a public nuisance or a hazard to the public safety. Therefore, in addition to any other penalty imposed by this Code for a violation of this Chapter, if the Fire Department is dispatched to a fire caused as a result of any act, omission, condition, or thing that constitutes a violation of this Chapter, the person causing, permitting, or maintaining such occurrence, may be charged a fee to cover the Fire Department's cost for responding to such public nuisance. Any such fee shall be charged as established by the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District Commission. The charge shall be collected as a debt and, if the charge is not paid within thirty (30) calendar days of the date of billing, an administrative collection charge of ten percent (10%) of the charge shall be added to the amount due, plus interest shall accrue thereon at the rate of one percent (1%) per month until paid. If the owner of the property where the public nuisance occurred caused, permitted, or maintained such public nuisance, such charge shall be extended upon the current or next tax roll, to the extent allowed by law.

# 5.10 FIRE LANES AND FIRE HYDRANTS.

- (1) FIRE LANES AND FIRE HYDRANTS REQUIRED. Fire lanes and fire hydrants shall be required in accordance with this Chapter on public or private property used for assembly, commercial, educational, industrial, institutional, or multi-family dwelling purposes, and on private property containing residential developments consisting of three or more dwelling units to which access is provided from a public street by a private road or driveway where any dwelling unit is set back more than fifty (50) feet from the paved portion of the public street. Fire lanes may also be designated on those private roads where it is found by the Fire Chief that such access is necessary for firefighting equipment and apparatus. No building permit shall be issued without compliance with the terms of this Chapter if any part of the area being developed contains any of the uses or conditions described in this Chapter.
- (2)LOCATION AND MAINTENANCE OF FIRE LANES AND FIRE HYDRANTS. Fire lanes and fire hydrants shall be located where necessary to provide fire protection to all buildings and premises within the City as determined by the Fire Department. In all cases, a fire hydrant shall be located within 350 feet from each building to be served by the hydrant and all hydrants shall be accessible to fire lanes. All existing and new fire hydrants located on private property shall be routinely inspected, repaired, tested, and maintained by the owner thereof as specified in American Water Works Association Manual 17, Installation, Field Testing and Maintenance of Fire Hydrants, and all fire hydrants shall satisfy the minimum performance requirements established by the Baraboo Water Utility for City fire hydrants. Personnel of the City's Public Works department, Baraboo Water Utility, and Fire Department shall have open and free access to all fire hydrants upon public and private property within the City at any reasonable time for the purpose of inspecting, repairing, testing, and maintaining fire hydrants. The fire flow test

procedures in NFPA Ch. 291, Fire Flow Testing and Marking of Hydrants, shall be followed when performing fire hydrant fire flow tests.

- (3) SNOW REMOVAL. Each owner and/or each occupant of any premises adjacent to a fire lane and/or a fire hydrant shall remove snow and ice from a fire lane and/or each fire hydrant within 48 hours after the cessation of a snow event.
- (4) WRITTEN RECORDS. Written records shall be maintained by the City Utility Superintendent showing the installation, inspection, field testing, repair, and maintenance of each fire hydrant within the City. Such records shall be made available for inspection and copying upon request to the City.
- (5) DUTIES AND POWERS OF FIRE CHIEF. All building and project development plans for projects covered by this Chapter shall be referred to the Fire Chief for examination and approval. If the Fire Chief finds that a proposed fire lane or fire hydrant in a development project does not comply with this Chapter, the Fire Chief shall be authorized to specify the changes necessary to bring the proposal into compliance. The Fire Chief shall inspect the construction of any fire lanes and the placement and specifications of any fire hydrant required by this Chapter and no occupancy permit shall be issued for any project covered by this Chapter until the Fire Chief has inspected and approved the fire lanes and fire hydrants.
- (6) DESIGNATION AND SIGNAGE FOR FIRE LANES. The owner or occupant of any premises where a fire lane is required under this Chapter shall designate and mark all fire lanes and shall post appropriate signs indicating the existence of all fire lanes and indicating that no parking is permitted on fire lanes at any time, as specified and approved by the Fire Chief. Signs and markings shall be used in such locations and in such a manner as in the judgment of the Fire Chief will carry out the purposes of this Chapter and give adequate warning to users of the premises where the fire lanes and fire hydrants are located. Signage and markings shall meet the following minimum standards:
- (a) Where reasonably feasible, signs shall be erected within 5 feet of the beginning and within 5 feet of the end of the fire lane with spacing between signs not exceeding 75 feet. Each sign shall face in the direction of oncoming traffic and shall be affixed to a stationary pole or object.
- (b) Curb along a fire lane shall be painted yellow and if no curb exists, a 4-inch wide stripe shall be painted the full length of the fire lane. Lanes identified exclusively as fire lanes shall be identified with approved fire lane signs on each side facing forward and the pavement area between the signs shall be striped with 4-inch wide yellow strips.
  - (7) OBSTRUCTIONS OTHER THAN MOTOR VEHICLES. No person who is the owner or occupant of a premises required by this Chapter to maintain a fire lane or a fire hydrant shall place, locate, permit, or allow the placement or location of any obstruction of any fire lane or so as to block access to any fire hydrant.

(8) Restricted Parking in Fire Lanes. No person shall park or otherwise leave unattended any motor vehicle within any fire lane.

# 5.11 KEY LOCK BOX SYSTEM.

- (1) The following structures shall be equipped with a key lock box or a component thereof at or near the main entrance or such other location required by the Fire Chief:
  - (a) Commercial or industrial structures protected by an automatic alarm system or automatic suppression system, or such structures that are secured in a manner that restricts access during an emergency.
  - (b) Multi- family residential structures protected by an automatic alarm system, or automatic suppression system, or that have restricted access through locked doors and have a common corridor for access to the living units.
  - (c) Governmental structures.
  - (d) Any special facilities or properties that may possess restricted access by the means of a fence, gate, or similar device.
- (2) This Subsection shall not be construed to require a key lock box for the following structures or uses:
  - (a) One- and two-family dwellings.
  - (b) Hospitals, nursing homes, jails, or other institutional use buildings when on-site staff is available at all times.
  - (c) Commercial or industrial structures when on-site staff is available at all times.
  - (d) In the event that any of the structures or uses as set forth in this paragraph install a key lock box system, it shall meet and comply with all the requirements of this ordinance.
- (3) All newly constructed structures subject to this Chapter shall have the key lock box installed and operational prior to the issuance of an occupancy permit. All existing structures as of the effective date of this ordinance and subject to its provisions shall have one year to install an operational key lock box.
- (4) The Fire Chief shall designate the type of key lock box system to be implemented within the City and shall have the authority to require all structures as set forth above in Subsection 5.11(1) of this ordinance to use the designated system.
- (5) The owner or operator of a structure required to have a key lock box shall, at all times, keep current key(s) in the key lock box, each of which shall be clearly marked so as to indicate its purposes, that will allow access to the structure. The key lock box shall contain the following keys, as applicable:

- (a) Keys to locked points of ingress and egress, whether on the interior or exterior of such buildings.
- (b) Keys to locked mechanical rooms.
- (c) Keys to locked elevator rooms.
- (d) Keys to elevator controls.
- (e) Keys to any fence or secured areas.
- (f) Keys to any other areas as directed by the Fire Chief or Deputy Fire Inspector.
- (g) Keys required by this Chapter shall not include keys to individual living units in a multi-family residential structure.
- (6) The Fire Chief shall be authorized to implement rules and regulations for the placement and use of the key lock box system.
- (7) The Fire Department is authorized to share key lock box access with other public safety departments, including the Sauk County Sheriff's Department, and the City Police Department, under rules and policies to be established by the Fire Chief.
- (8) Entry keys shall be updated as necessary and will be checked as part of the fire inspection visits.
- (9) The owner or operator of a structure required to have a key lock box system shall provide to the Fire Department a list each year of the emergency contacts in case of an emergency requiring the use of the key lock box.
- (10) Any person who owns or operates a structure subject to this Chapter shall be subject to the penalties set forth in general penalty provisions of this Code for any violations of this Chapter.
- **5.12 SEVERABILITY**. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Chapter is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by reason of any decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of any other section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase or portion thereof, and to this extent, the provisions of this ordinance shall be severable.
- **5.13 PENALTY**. Any person who violates, disobeys, neglects, omits, or refuses to comply with or who resists the enforcement of any of the provisions of this Chapter, or any order, rule, or regulation made hereunder shall be subject to a penalty of \$100-\$500. In addition to the payment of a forfeiture, the City Attorney may, in addition to other remedies provided by law, institute appropriate action or proceedings to prevent or enjoin the erection, enlargement, alteration, repair, moving or occupancy of any building or structure located on any premises in violation of this Chapter. In any such action, the fact that a permit was issued shall not constitute a defense and each

violation and each day a violation continues or occurs shall constitute a separate offense.

(k) Serve as personnel officer for the City and perform promptly, efficiently, and effectively the following personnel related duties, except as otherwise provided for by State Statute or City ordinance. (See §43.58, Wis. Stat., for the powers and duties of the Library Board and §1.19 of this Code for the powers and duties of the Police Commission.)

# 6. Sec. 1.19 of the Baraboo Municipal Code shall be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

# 1.19 BARABOO POLICE COMMISSION.

- (1) MEMBERSHIP. The Baraboo Police Commission shall consist of five appointed citizens, as provided for by §62.13, Wis. Stats.
- (2) POWERS AND DUTIES. The Commission shall have the powers and duties prescribed in §62.13, Wis. Stats., except sub. (6) thereof. In addition, the Commission shall be authorized to interview, select and appoint persons hired to fill non-sworn support staff positions of the Police Department, provided however that the position has been authorized and approved by the Common Council and the Common Council reserves the power to establish the salary and benefits for each position.

7. Sec. 1.59(3)(c) of the Baraboo Municipal Code shall be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

(c) Unless otherwise prohibited by law, the following departments, commissions and boards shall be responsible for keeping, maintaining and preserving all public records required by this Code and the Wisconsin State Statutes and the legal custodian of these records for the following departments, commissions and boards shall be as indicated Page 52 of 102 below, provided that such designated officer may appoint an employee of his/her staff to act as legal custodian:

- Police Department Police Chief

- Board of Zoning Appeals Zoning Administrator / Building Inspector

- U.W. Baraboo/Sauk County Campus Commission Official designated by the Commission

All petitions, applications, correspondence, maps, plats or other written communications, documents or records filed with a City officer or staff member, elected official or appointed official and which may require action or follow-up by the above identified departments, commissions or boards shall be promptly delivered to the legal custodian named above, or to his/her designee, in his/her capacity as legal custodian of said record.

# 8. Sec. 2.05(3)(b) and (c) of the Baraboo Municipal Code shall be and are hereby amended to read as follows:

- Public Safety Committee. The Public Safety Committee shall advise the Common (b) Council on all matters dealing with streets, sidewalks, allevs, storm drains, drainageways, sewers, traffic and parking matters, health and safety issues, nuisances, and any other duties assigned by the Council. Additionally, the Public Safety Committee shall serve in an oversight capacity with respect to matters concerning police and fire operations, except where such matters are the direct responsibility of the Baraboo Police Commission, Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District Personnel Board, or Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District Commission. It shall be the duty of this committee, under the direction of the Council, to keep the streets, sidewalks, alleys, sewers, storm drains, and drainage ways, and related public works in repair. This Committee supersedes and replaces the Committees formerly known as the Traffic Committee, Health & Welfare Committee, and Public Works Committee and this Committee shall assume jurisdiction and responsibility over all matters assigned or delegated to the Traffic Committee, Health & Welfare Committee, and Public Works Committee in other provisions of this Code or by duly adopted and approved resolutions, policies, and contracts of the City.
- (c) <u>Administrative Committee</u>. The Administrative Committee shall advise the Common Council on all matters dealing with the maintenance and upkeep of all City property

except property directly administered by other boards and commissions, the review of license applications, except those licenses administered by other Boards, Commissions and City staff, the review of proposed legislation not directly involving other Boards, Commissions or Committees and advising City staff regarding response to legislative matters, relationships with other governmental entities, such as the Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District, School District, Legislature, etc., and any duties assigned by the Council. This Committee shall review and advise the Common Council on matters involving the sale of City owned personal property. Except where specific jurisdiction and responsibility has been assigned in this section to another committee, this Committee shall serve as a liaison to the Library Board, Parks and Recreation Commission, Community Development Authority, Baraboo Police Commission, Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District Commission, Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District Personnel Board, U.W. Baraboo Campus Commission, City Attorney, and City Assessor. This Committee supersedes and replaces the Committees formerly known as the Property Committee and License & Ordinance Committee and this Committee shall assume jurisdiction and responsibility over all matters assigned or delegated to the Property Committee or License & Ordinance Committee in other provisions of this Code or by duly adopted and approved resolutions, policies and contracts of the City.

# 9. Section 4.01(2) of the Baraboo Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

(2) APPOINTMENT; TERMS. Pursuant to §62.13, Wis. Stats., the Baraboo Police Commission shall appoint the Chief of Police who shall hold office during good behavior and subject to suspension or removal by the Commission for cause. The Chief of Police shall appoint subordinates, subject to approval by the Commission. Such appointments shall be made by promotion when this can be done with advantage, otherwise, from eligibility list provided by examination and approval by the Commission and kept on file with the City Clerk.

# 10. Sec. 7.09(16)(b) of the Baraboo Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

(b) The Baraboo Area Joint Fire and Emergency Medical Services District shall have nineteen (19) reserved parking spaces in the City parking lot located on the southwest corner of the intersection of Fifth Street and Ash Street.

(2), above, shall, upon direction of any Police, Fire, Emergency Management, or Public Health official, begin immediate actions to contain, cleanup, and remove to an approved repository the offending material or materials and restore the site to its original condition, with the offending person, firm, or corporation being responsible for all expenses incurred. Should any person fail to engage the necessary personnel and equipment to comply or complete the requirements of this section, the Police, Fire, or Emergency Management Departments may order the required actions to be

taken by public or private resources, without taking bids, and allow the recovery of any and all costs incurred by the City as action imposed by subsection (4).

- (5) SITE ACCESS. The Owner, Lessee, or Occupant of any site, public or private, where a prohibited discharge is occurring or where there is probable cause to believe that such discharge is occurring shall provide access to personnel of the Police Department, Fire Department, Emergency Management Department, and Public Works Department of the City for the purpose of evaluating the threat to the public health and safety and to monitor the containment, cleanup, or restoration activity needed for the protection of public health or safety. In the event voluntary access is not granted by the owner, lessee, or occupant, the appropriate officer of the Police or Fire Department may obtain an administrative search warrant and, after receiving the same, may enter the premises.
- (6) PUBLIC PROTECTION. Should any prohibited discharge occur that reasonably causes a threat to the life, safety, welfare, or health of the public, a Police or Fire Department officer or employee on the scene may order an evacuation of the area or take other appropriate protective steps for such period of time as needed until the Mayor, Common Council, or Emergency Management officials can act.

#### Resolved, by the Common Council of the City of Baraboo, Sauk County, Wisconsin:

That the proposed 2024 BID budget in the amount of \$50,400.00 and attached hereto is approved, and; That the following is made a part of the Budget.

1. A reserve, to be known as the Reserve for Public Parking, Acquisition and Infrastructure Improvement Reserve, is established to be funded as follows:

The unspent balance, as determined by appropriate accounting methods, of the funds for each fiscal year as of December 31 of each year, shall be placed in a reserve to be used exclusively for acquisition of land for public parking purposes, lighting, marking, signing, and landscaping of municipal parking lots and sidewalks, acquisition and public placement of receptacles for trash and garbage collection. Funds may be expended for these purposes at any time upon the affirmative vote of any five Directors.

Other than for the foregoing purposes, funds shall be expended from the reserve only on the affirmative vote of three quarters of all of the Directors of the BID.

- 2. In order to be paid, all bills must be signed by a BID Director or employee prior to being submitted to the Finance Committee.
- 3. All bills to be paid must be in the hands of the Treasurer no later than noon on the Friday immediately prior to the regular monthly meeting of the BID Board of Directors.
- 4. All Directors are to be compensated out of the General Administrative Account for the following expenses necessarily incurred: Postage, photocopies at \$.15 per page, mileage at IRS approved rates when authorized in advance by the BID Board of Directors.
- 5. All BID funds are to be turned in to either the BID Treasurer or the City Treasurer within 72 hours or receipt of the same. If turned in to the City Treasurer, the receipt for same shall be turned in to the BID Treasurer within 72 hours of receiving same.
- 6. No purchase or an obligation of the BID shall be paid in cash. All such purchases and obligations shall be paid by check issued by the City Treasurer.
- 7. Any non-budgeted items of income received during a fiscal year shall be placed in the contingency fund for the same year.

Payment of the assessments shall be made by assessing the properties benefited as indicated in the Report and that the assessments shown on the report, representing an exercise of police power, have been determined on a reasonable basis and are hereby confirmed. The assessments are due and payable interest free on or before March 1, 2024 and assessments not paid by September 1, 2024 shall become a delinquent tax against the property as provided by Section 66.60 (15), Wis. Stats.

The City Clerk shall publish the resolution as a Class 1 notice under Chapter 985, Wis. Stats., in the assessment district and a copy of this resolution and a statement of the final assessment against the benefited property shall be mailed to every property owner whose name appears on the assessment roll, whose post office address is known or can with reasonable diligence be ascertained.

**Background:** The Water Utility completed a "Simplified Rate Case" application with the Public Service Commission (PSC) for an 8% inflationary rate increase. The inflationary rate increase factor is established by the PSC each year. Our application was approved on June 14, 2023 with our new rates being effective January 1, 2024. The significant items of the budget are: Water main, hydrant & utility-owned service replacements in conjunction with the State of WI Hwy. 33 reconstruction; Oak St. Reservoir rehabilitation; Increase in water meters and radio transmitters for new development construction.

## The City of Baraboo, Wisconsin

The City of Baraboo Wastewater Utility contracted with the accounting firm, Baker Tilly LLP, to complete a sewer rate study. The last study was conducted by the same firm in 2018 when the Utility established a tiered billing structure implementing a "fixed" fee along with a "usage" fee similar to the Water Utility.

Utility staff compiled extensive data to include current consumption by customer class along with anticipated expenses, capital improvement projects, and system growth so Baker Tilly could design equitable sewer rates ensuring adequate future revenues, needed to effectively operate the Wastewater Utility, were achieved.

As a result of the independent sewer rate study, this budget does increase rates 7% for City residents and 12% for the outlying areas.

**Background:** Baraboo Water Utilities has received class action settlement notices related to PFAS (Perfluoroalkyl and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances) settlements with 3M and DuPont.

At this time, the City has not detected any PFAS in its drinking water. The lack of detection has serious implications for whether the City will receive payouts from these settlements. With limited funds for testing (up to \$200/source from DuPont settlement and up to \$800/source from 3M settlement), municipalities that do not have a PFAS detection in one or more of their water sources by December 31, 2030 will not receive any money from either settlement.

The City would be taking a significant risk by remaining in the settlements. There is no way to predict if a detection will be found in the next 7 years but would still be bound by the settlement releases if it has a detection after December 31, 2030.

After consulting with the City's legal counsel, it has been advised to consider opting out of both settlements to preserve any future claims it may have against 3M and DuPont.

#### MEMORANDUM

RE:	3M and DuPont PFAS Settlements

This memo is being provided to give guidance on whether the City should opt-out of the 3M and DuPont PFAS settlements by the December 4, 2023 (DuPont) and December 11, 2023 (3M) opt-out deadlines.

Public water utilities, such as the City, have received class action settlement notices related to PFAS settlements with 3M and DuPont. There are two separate settlements, and the terms of the settlements differ somewhat.

One thing that is the same with both settlements is that the City will be covered by the settlements (and will have released the claims identified in the settlement agreements) unless the City affirmatively opts-out of the settlements. If the City stays in the settlements, the City will be granting the releases in the settlement agreements even if it does not file a claim or receive any money from the settlements.

The releases in the 3M and DuPont settlements are different. The DuPont settlement release appears to be more limited and focuses on claims related to drinking water impacts. Whereas the release provided in the 3M settlement is much broader, releasing 3M from all of the following claims:

- All claims related to PFAS and drinking water or your public water system.
- All claims for punitive or exemplary damages that relates to PFAS or any product manufactured with or containing PFAS. This is not limited to just drinking water claims.
- All claims that relate to or involve representations about PFAS or any product manufactured with or containing PFAS. This would likely release any failure to warn claim the City would have against 3M and is not limited to just drinking water claims.

- All claims related to development, manufacture, formulation, distribution, sale, transportation, storage, loading, mixing, application, or use of PFAS or any product manufactured with or containing PFAS, with a limited exception for federal or state required investigation or remediation costs to address PFAS contamination on municipal property that is not related to the public water system. This is not limited to just drinking water claims.
- All claims that relate to the municipality's transport, disposal, or arrangement for disposal of PFAS containing waste or PFAS containing wastewater, with a limited exception for required costs to remediate or remove PFAS contamination at a municipality's permitted wastewater or stormwater system. This is not limited to just drinking water claims.

At this time, the City has not detected any PFAS in its drinking water. While that is a good thing, the lack of detection has serious implications for whether the City will receive payouts from these settlements. Besides limited money for testing (up to \$200/source from the DuPont settlement and up to \$800/source from the 3M settlement), municipalities that do not have a PFAS detection in one or more of their water sources by December 31, 2030 will not receive any money from either settlement. Therefore, the City would be taking a significant risk by remaining in the settlements, as there is no way to predict if it will have a detection in the next 7 years but would still be bound by the settlement releases if it has a detection after December 31, 2030.

Should the City have a detection by December 31, 2030, the amount it would receive is based on the amount of PFAS contamination detected and the flow rate of the source. For the City's flow rate, the payout under the 3M settlement is estimated to be between \$115,244 to \$189,694 for the minimal contamination amount (2) and \$1,767,967 to \$2,909,596 for the maximum contamination amount (1000), and under the DuPont settlement is estimated to be between \$11,203 to \$18,203 for the minimal contamination amount (2) and \$169,601 to \$279,118 for the maximum contamination amount (1000).

Considering the City's lack of detection and the broad releases imposed by the settlement agreements, it is my opinion that the City should consider opting out of both settlements to preserve any future claims it may have against 3M and DuPont.

*Background:* Following is an excerpt of the City of Baraboo Employee Personnel Policy & Procedure Handbook - Section 4 COMPENSATION:

4.01 Clothing Allowance

- B. Procedure
  - 1. The City agrees to provide adequate protective rain gear, welding gear, and any other required equipment to those employees who require the same for the safe performance of their jobs. <u>All protective gear shall</u> <u>be stored</u>, when not in use, in facilities of the City of Baraboo.
  - 2. For workers in the Street, Parks, and Utility Departments, the City will provide a clothing allowance of \$150.00 per year. The allowance shall be paid in a January paycheck.
  - 3. The City shall provide each employee required to wear safety shoes a reimbursement for such shoes up to \$150.00 per year on an as needed basis and as approved by the Department Head.
  - 4. Employees authorized to receive appropriate shirts, jackets, and/or hats by the City because of the nature of the employee's job in dealing with the public, namely under circumstances when it is not readily apparent the employee is an employee of the City, shall receive an allowance as determined in the reasonable discretion of the Department Head and with the City Administrator's approval.

The current amounts are the same as they have been since the Handbook was originally adopted in July 2012.

The proposed revision combines 2 and 3 above to the following, which includes an increase to account for inflation over the last 11+ years:

2. For workers in the Street, Parks, and Utility Departments, the City will provide a clothing and safety shoe allowance of \$400 per year. The allowance will be included on the payroll check that covers January 1<sup>st</sup>.

In addition, the increase in pay for a WRRF and Water Utility employee who is serving in the capacity of Acting Foreman receives an additional flat rate of pay. That original flat rate was established in 2016 and based on the increased differential between the employee's and foreman's respective rates of pay. Since that differential has increased over the last 7+ years, the flat rates should be increased as follows:

- 4.06 Foreman Pay Temporary Assignment
- B. Procedure
  - 1. Water Utility: Any Water Utility Crewman that is acting as the Foreman in the Water Utility Foreman's absence will be compensated an additional a flat rate of \$1.00\$ \$3.00 per hour.

- 2. For workers in the Street, Parks, and Utility Departments, the City will provide a clothing and safety shoe allowance of \$400 per year. The allowance will be included annually on the payroll check that covers January 1<sup>st</sup>.
- 3. Employees authorized to receive appropriate shirts, jackets, and/or hats by the City because of the nature of the employee's job in dealing with the public, namely under circumstances when it is not readily apparent the employee is an employee of the City, shall receive an allowance as determined in the reasonable discretion of the Department Head and with the City Administrator's approval.

This also includes reducing the available vehicles by two vans during the hours of 10:00am to 5:00pm, a total reduction of 3,900 hours.
